The dairy achievement award was presented to Andrew Stoltzfus.

In the new varieties corn contest, Earl Weaver and Bill Fisher placed first and second, respectively. Weaver's yield of 157.8

ahead of the second-place entry. It was noted that 23 different growers competed in the contest.
