## Pa. grocery prices survey

market survey report, the regional shopping bag Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture recently disclosed that retail prices for 15 "shopping bag" items from August, 1975 to January, 1976 rose an average of 17 cents from \$9.23 to \$9.40.

The study, prepared by the department's Bureau of Rural Affairs, showed the average state shopping bag cost dipped to a low of \$9.13 in September and then rose slowly through December to \$9.21. A sharp increase during the last month of the study brought the price to \$9.40.

Overall, the six-month state shopping bag average was \$9.22. In a breakdown of

HARRISBURG - Com- seven regions in the Completing a six-month super- monwealth, the highest average was in the Northeast at \$9.58. The lowest average was recorded in the south central counties at \$8.89.

Products which basically increased in price over the six months were cabbage, fresh pears, coffee, eggs and American cheese. Products which decreased in price were potatoes, canned corn, sugar, shortening, whole chicken and ground beef. Several products which followed no basic trend during the six months were canned peaches, bread, cornflakes and toilet paper. For the six months analysis, shoopers in urban stores saved five percent
