Eighteen Northern Lancaster County dairymen were honored for having high producing herds this past year at the twelfth annual District 4 meeting for Atlantic Breeders Cooperative members held February 24 at the Blue Ball Fire Hall.

Receiving Certificates of Merit for having top Dairy Herd Improvement Association were: Henry Kettering, Lititz R3; Earl N. Landis, Manheim R7; Donald Eby, Gordonville R1; Clyde Martin, East Earl R1; Christian Zook, Gap R2; David L. Landis, Colebrook Rd., Lancaster; Titus Stoner, Bowman Rd.,

Landisville; Arthur Wenger, Manheim R6; Harry Aungst, Marietta R1; Nathan E. Stoltzfus, Gap R2; Albert Fry, Manheim R7; Hiram Aungst, Elizabethtown R1; Ivan S. Stoltzfus, Honey Brook R1; Harold Shelly, Manheim R2; Harvey Heller, Willow Rd., Lancaster; Masonic Homes Farms, Elizabethtown; J. Wilmer Conrad, Newport Rd., Lititz; Alvin K. Bollinger, Lititz R4.

All herds were at least 15 per cent above the state average for butterfat last year, while at least two-thirds of the cows in these herds are progeny of Atlantic sires. The awards were presented by C. P. Brantley, Atlantic's Field Supervisor for this area.

Reports by District 4 Director Clyde Martin of East Earl, Pa., and management representative Willis Ritchey, Service Manager, informed members that 1975 was a very successful business year for Atlantic. The service program was up-dated with the entire area divided into 66 units and all farmer members can now use WATS numbers to call toll-free for AI service. Atlantic sires maintained their rating among the nation's best for transmitting profitable traits, Ritchey said.
