Sewing contest set

HARRISBURG — Another record event is anticipated in the Pennsylvania State Grange's annual sewing contest which closes April 30, according to Mrs. Leroy Hoover, of Roaring Spring, director of women's activities for the organization.

Last year more than 2,800 entries were received, and one winner — Mary Schuler, of Fleetwood R3 — was one of four first place winners in the National Grange competition. The goal for this

year's contest is 3,000 entries, Mrs. Hoover said.

Garments in the four categories will be judged locally immediately following the April 30 deadline. This will be followed by county and the statewide competition in May, Mrs. Hoover said.

First place winners in each of the categories will then go on to the National Grange competition in New York.

Sausage Sizzlers

With income taxes due this month, your budget may be feeling an extra pinch. Remember, wise shoppers determine the cost per serving before purchasing meat. Lean meat such as hamburger, stew meat or boneless roasts yield 3 to 4 servings per pound; most roasts and steaks with some bone provide 2 to 3 servings

per pound; steaks and ribs with a lot of bone, fat and gristle yield only 1 to 2 servings; but one pound of skinless franks serves 4 to 5 persons and you can satisfy 7 people with sliced bologna, salami or summer sausage if it's used in a casserole or in sandwiches.

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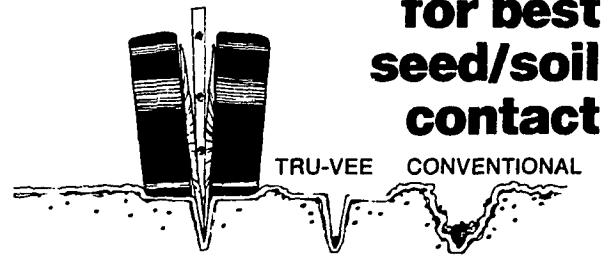
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
