He took the people's business out of the smoke-filled rooms

The Sunshine Law (Act 175 of 1974) introduced by Marv, opened the doors of local and state government meetings to the public and the press.

He restored voluntary prayer in the public schools

Act 305 of 1972, introduced by Marv Miller, permits voluntary prayer and release-time Bible study by public school students.

His concern helped combat drug abuse in Pennsylvania

In 1972, Marv served on a Select House Committee that revised Pennsylvania's drug laws to permit harsh sentences on pushers.

He fought for equal pay for injured workers

Marv Miller sponsored the bill that grants equitable disability compensation to Pennsylvania's industrially crippled.

He works to rebuild public faith in government

In 1974, Marv Miller proposed immediate expulsion of any member of the Pennsylvania House or Senate who is convicted of a major crime such as bribery, embezzlement or extortion.

Farmland assessment was an idea he proposed

The original House bill to assess farmland at actual use value was sponsored by Marv.

He voted to remove chiselers from the relief rolls

In 1974, Marv voted to close loopholes in the state's assistance laws.
