This being the bicentennial year, Pennay spoke on the "200 Years of Agricultural Progress" in the United States.

He pointed out that lime and chemical fertilizers were responsible for the development of agriculture in this country and that through the liming program provided by the U.S. government was the beginning of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. In the early days of this country nine out of ten people were farmers. Today three out of one hundred are farmers but as Pennay quickly stated, "because of the technical advances, agriculture is still one of the leading industries of this nation."

Pennay pointed out that the early education leaders of this country were instrumental in developing agriculture. They were agronomists in that they studied crop rotation, liming practices and drainage problems. They were inventors in developing a seed drill, moldboards for plows

and even a threshing machine. Even our educated farmers of today can produce a surplus of food for ourselves with exports available to other nations.

What is going to happen to agriculture in the next 200 years?, Pennay asked the group of 75 in attendance. We have to be concerned with land development and our conservation problems," he quickly answered. "It is up to our local people," our county ASC Committeemen and farmers to consider our food problems of tomorrow.

Let us never forget that the cultivation of the earth is the most important labor of man.
