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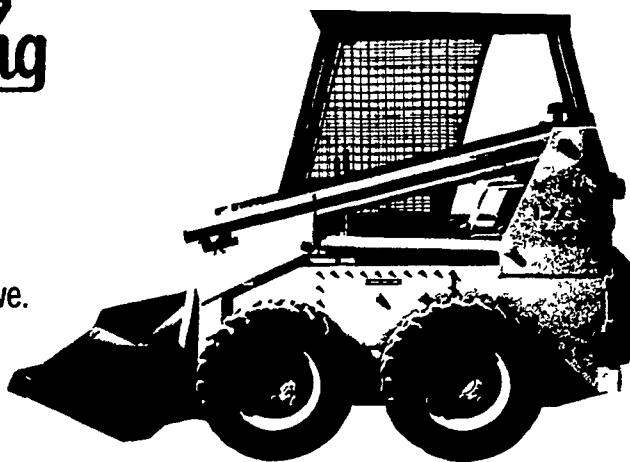
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Pa. clean streams standards explained at COWAMP parley

HARRISBURG - The public committee that is reviewing Pennsylvania's Comprehensive Water Quality Management Plan (COWAMP) was told last month that the law requires that all streams be clean enough to allow their use for water supply, aquatic life and recreation. This was in reply to the question raised by Gideon Yachin representing Adams County, "is it the law's intent to have every inch of stream in Pennsylvania fishable?" In order to support fish, as well as other uses, the stream must meet certain water

quality standards. Many communities need to upgrade treatment of sewage to meet these standards which in turn increases sewage bills to the public. Richard Boardman, chief of the Division of Water Quality of the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Resources outlined the provisions of the Pennsylvania Clean Streams Law and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act that clearly requires that all streams be fishable. However, he noted that there is some flexibility since a stream can be designated for trout which need high quality water or for warm water fish

such as bass which can live in a lower quality water. He also emphasized that the COWAMP process must comply with the existing laws but can recommend changes to the laws and added that COWAMP will study the financial and management aspects of water pollution control to obtain the best value for the dollar spent.

The overall goal of "COWAMP" is to establish a plan which can be implemented that will achieve and maintain surface and ground water quality in a manner that is economically sound and consistent with other environmental goals.

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
