USDA reference list offered

WASHINGTON, D.C. - The U.S. Department Agriculture's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service is offering a consumer reference list of over 200 popular meat and poultry products. The list briefly describes standards required of items federally inspected and specifies the amount of meat or poultry each product must contain.

To cite a few - meat pies and chili con carne with beans must have at least 25 per cent meat: a high meat dinner for babies must have 30 per cent meat (65 per cent for a meat and broth and broth baby-food item); corned beef hash must have at least 35 per cent meat and no more than 15 per cent fat; condensed chicken soup must contain at least four per cent chicken meat: and Sloppy Joe sauces with meat are required to contain at least 35 per cent meat.
