In a message to the groups during the meeting, David C. Scott, chairman of the board, chief executive officer and president of Allis-Chalmers, described the Agricultural Equipment group as one of the core businesses of the corporation. He pointed out the many capital improvements for facilities and machinery which have been. and are being instituted within the agricultural equipment manufacturing operations, as part of a commitment to expand upon

marketing actions; and set the company's position as a leading farm supplier in the agricultural machinery.

Scott said wholesale sales for the group had increased approximately 20 per cent during 1975 over 1974, and that sales for the first half of 1976 have continued that trend.


