

Pa. Jersey breeders shut out

HARRISBURG. Pennsylvania Jerseys were shut out of the winners circle during the All American Jersey Show held here on Thursday. But placing within the top five of various classes were entries from Shady Hill-Side Farm, West Chester, Relaine Jerseys, Everett, Silesrite Jerseys, Littlestown, and Cicada Acres, Peach Bottom. The Pennsylvania herd took third place in the state herd or provincial contest. Seven states were represented.

For the fourth year in a row, H V F, formerly Happy Valley Farm, Danville, Kentucky, dominated the ratings in the All-American Jersey Show. H V F captured the grand champion honors in the female division as well as the premier exhibitor banner. H V F's grip on the competition was broken only by the Pioneer Farm, Old Lyme, Conn. which showed

the grand and reserve grand champion bulls.

Generator Beauty (Clara), a five-year-old cow, was named the senior and grand champion female. A four-year-old, S R Merry Mia, owned and exhibited by the Ski-A-Rilla Jersey Farm, Westminster, Md., claimed the reserve senior and grand champion banners.

The junior champion female was a senior yearling heifer, Generators Violet Petula, shown by the Greenland Jersey Farm, Hopkinsville, Kentucky. Reserve junior champion female honors went to "W K Faithful Stacey," exhibited by Michael Heath, Westminster, Md.

The Pioneer Farm walked away with the bull honors. "Fashion's Reply," a bull calf, was judged junior champion and reserve grand champion bull. In addition,

Pioneer Farm's Merry Gladiator, a two-year-old, was named the senior champion and grand champion bull.

The reserve junior champion was a bull calf, U of D Baronet Supreme Falstaff, exhibited by Alice Haenlein, Newark, Delaware. Reserve senior champion bull honors were earned by "Sleeping Signal Sultan," a two-year-old

shown by the Windy Knoll Farm, Rockville, Md.

H V F Jerseys was named the premier exhibitor, and the Waverly Farm, Clearbrook, Va., was given the banner as premier breeder. The premier sire was Milestone Generator. The bull is now deceased, but his last owner was the American Breeder Service.

The judge for the show was Dr. Hilton Boynton, Richmond, Mass.

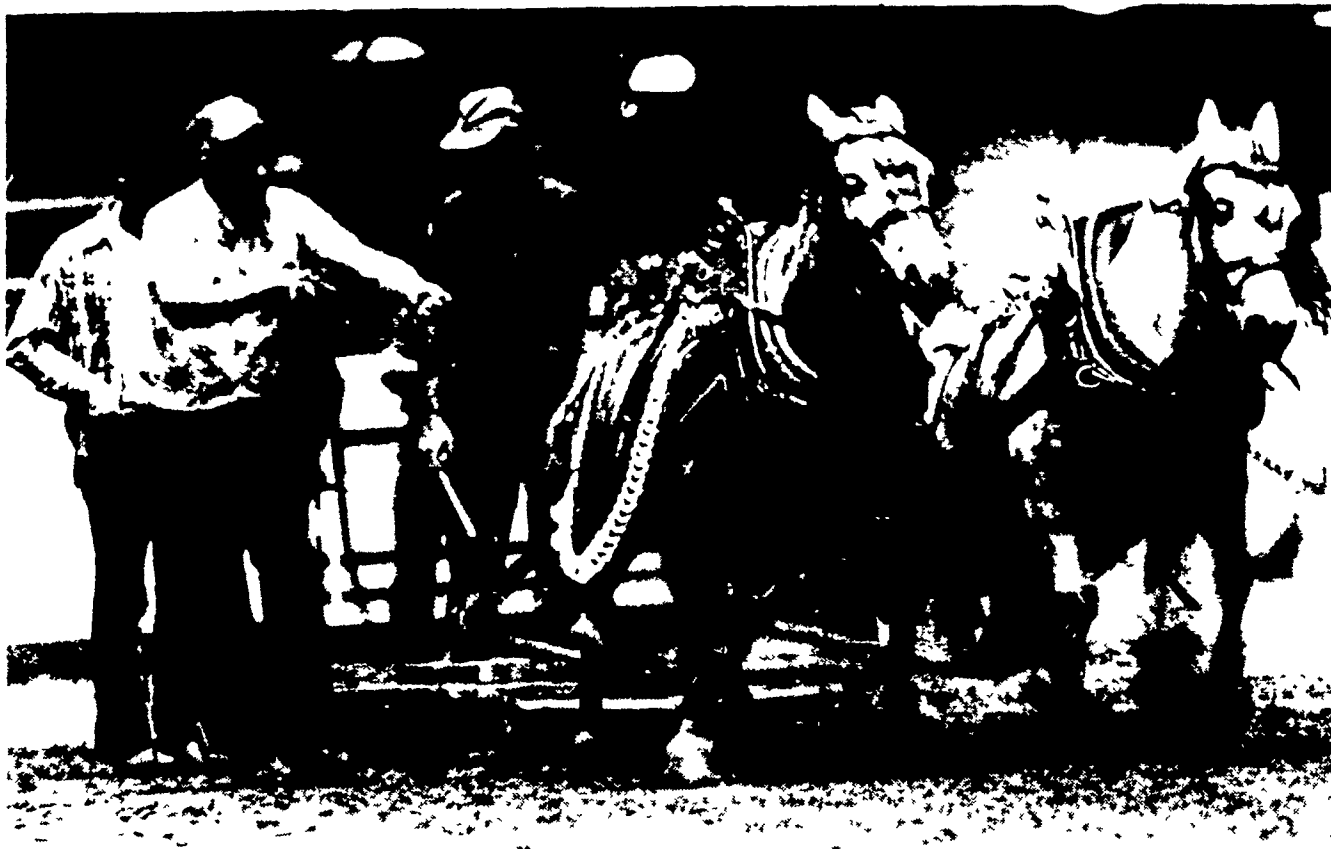

Community Fairs in Ephrata, New Holland, Manheim, Elizabethtown, and Lampeter are also conducting Apple Tag Days and will be staffed by

members of the Lancaster County Federated Women's Clubs. Free blood pressure testing will be provided at most of the Apple Tag Day sites. Apples for the project are being donated by the Kiwanis Clubs of Lancaster County.

Proceeds from this event will help to fund the Lancaster Chapter's Risk Factor Screening Program. This project helps to detect a person that may be at risk of having a heart attack or stroke.

Heart disease remains the number one killer in the nation and Lancaster County. This year's slogan, "WE'RE FIGHTING FOR YOUR LIFE," typifies the dedication and cause of the American Heart Association, Lancaster Pennsylvania Chapter, and all of their volunteers.

Competition in the contest

is limited to teams owned by Pennsylvania residents. Drivers must also be state residents.

First place winners

received \$60 and a trophy; second place, \$50; third, \$40; fourth, \$30; and fifth place, \$20, in each class.
