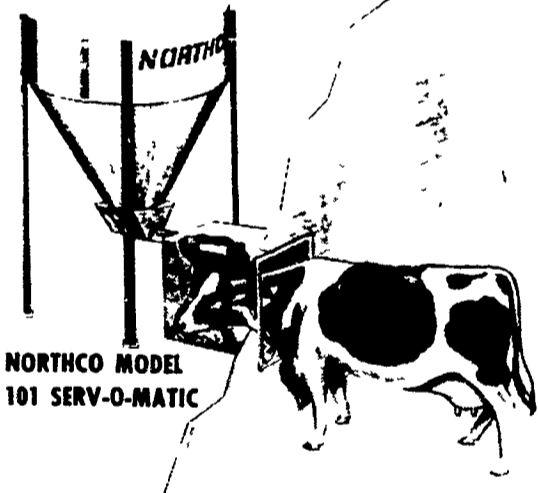
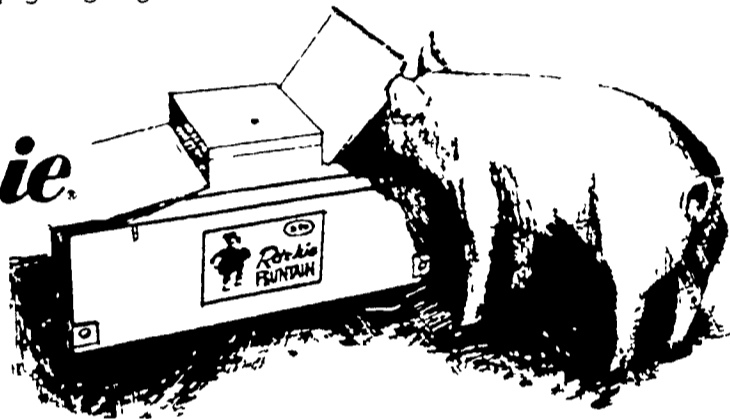

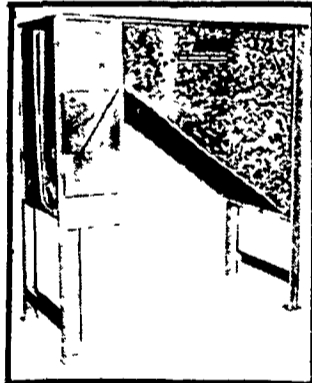

The "Magnet Feeder" That Selectively Feeds Concentrate or High Moisture Corn

The Model 101 Serv-O-Matic may be mounted through the wall in a loose housing system or through the fenceline for open lots. Side braces are also provided for mounting and installation.

The feeder opening is designed to permit only one cow to eat at a time. A 2 inch auger drops approximately 1 lb. of concentrate per minute into the feeder... this is the same rate the cow eats... no feed remains in the feeder when she moves away.

A simple magnet around the cow's neck will activate the feeder motor as she places her head into the feeder. Cows without a magnet are unable to get feed.

The Model 201 Serv-O-Matic is specially designed for moving high moisture corn. The augers provide a mixing motion as they move the corn from the 10 bushel hoppers, which has adequate capacity to provide extra rations to 20 or 30 cows.

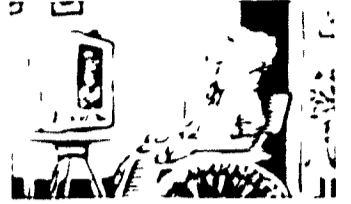
