## Growing pains cited

WASHINGTON, DC -People in rural communities have been accustomed to thinking about problems that come with populaton decline Now they need to think about problems that can come with population growth, according to the US Department of Agriculture

The new population trend in this country is one of growth in rural areas For the first time this century except for the Depression years, the population of nonmetropolitan counties is growing faster than the metropolitan population. (Nonmetro counties are ones with no city as large as 50,000 population.) More rural residents are choosing to stay in their home area instead of moving to the cities, many rural migrants of the past are returning home, and more city natives are moving to rural areas

According to USDA, most rural communities want to get in on the new population growth. Growth is a sign of a community's economic vitality and is usually a source of community pride.

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
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
