## Berks County Farm Women attend 25th annual convention

LEESPORT, Pa. - County officers, committee chairmen, and group presidents reported on business and events of the past year to nearly 200 members of the Berks County Society of Farm Women and guests who attended the Society's 25th Annual Convention at the Berks County Ag Center on October 2. The main business of the day, however, was the election of new officers for the coming year.

Outgoing President Anne Yanos presided over the business meeting and introduced nominees for the offices of vice president and secretary. Last year's vice president, Helen Ebling of Reading, will assume the president's gavel for the coming two years, and Ruth Walters, Douglasville R2, will maintain her position as county treasurer for the one remaining year of her two year term. Following the balloting, Darlene Yost of Bernville R1, moved into the vice presidential slot, and Dorothy Barrett, Perkiomenville R2, assumed the position of county secretary formerly held by Gail Malsbury.

Prior to the business meetings, the Society joined in a brief service to the memory of Sarah Marsteller, a 36-year member and one time county president from Douglasville R2 who died this past spring.

A sumptuous catered lunch followed the morning session, during which members and guests were invited to inspect a handsome assortment of hand made and home grown bazaar items being offered for sale.

After lunch, Berks County Dairy Princess Alternate Tammy Hafer offered her views on this year's county dairy princess contest, commenting on what the contestants personally gained through the experience, stressing the value of milk promotion, and explaining how the members own daughters can support the promotion effort by participating in next year's pageant.

Guest speaker, Dr. Garland Fisher of Pottstown, Pa., presented the group with his views on chiropractic medicine, focusing on what a chiropractor is and what he does.

#### Gradually introduce Corn Silage

Dairymen can avoid the corn silage blues by gradually introducing their cows to corn silage. Both the rumen microflora and lining must adjust to a major change in ration...such as the introduction of corn silage. This adjustment may require two to four weeks or more.

#### Need Water

Plants with shallow roots such as azaleas, rhododendrons, mountain laurel, and flowering dogwood need frequent waterings. It is a good practice to continue watering these plants on a regular basis until the ground freezes during fall.
