worked as a machinist, tool machinist and machinist A. Eberly was one of the first people hired into the Engineering Shop.

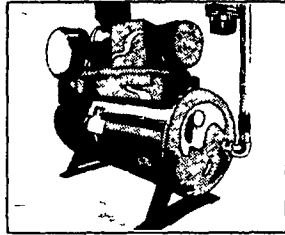
Richard L. Kilhefner, 837 Center Avenue, Eph., will retire after 28 years of service with the company. A production assembler,

Kilhefner was also employed as a spot welder, mechanical assembler and tester, and bench assembler.

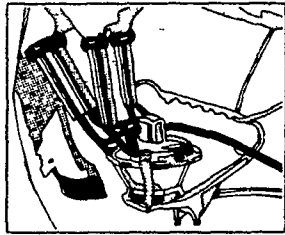

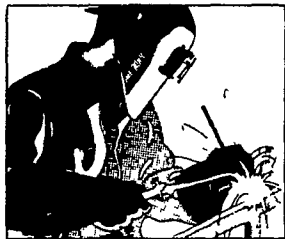
