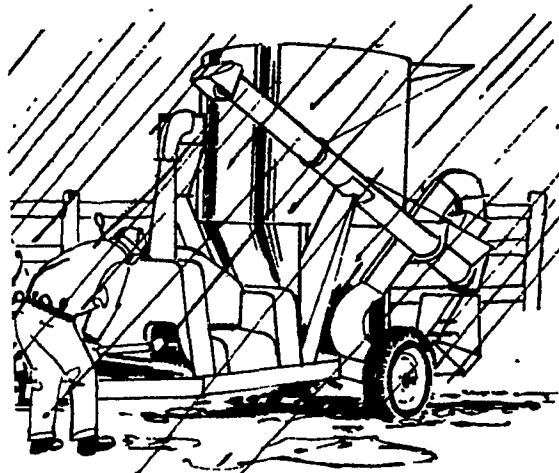
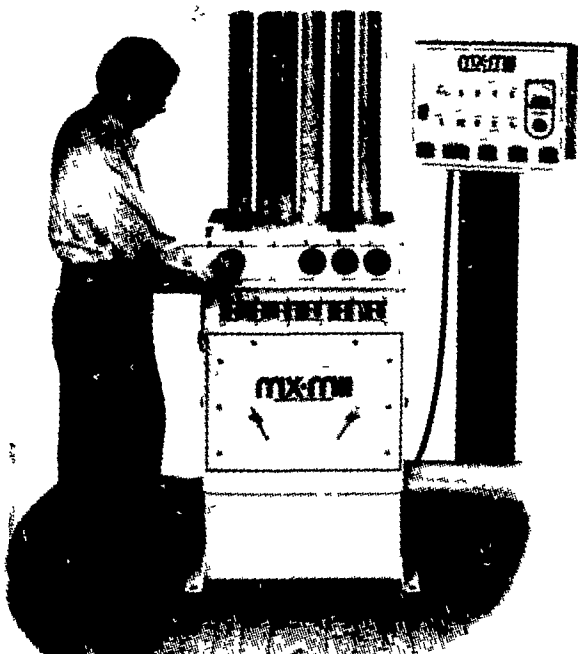

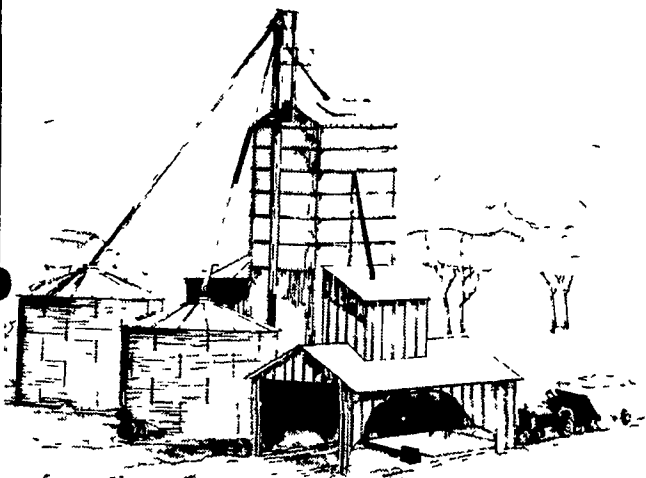

**Moll is member of  
national FFA band**

KANSAS CITY, Mo. - Leon Moll, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne L. Moll, of Bowers, Pa., was one of 120 FFA

members from across the nation who participated in the National FFA band. Moll was selected from over 500

applicants representing 44 states and played trombone. After two days of intensive practice prior to the convention, the band performed during all but one session of the 49th National Convention of the Future Farmers of America this past week in Kansas City, Mo. Moll is a member of the Kutztown FFA Chapter, where his advisors are Donald W. Reinert and Ben Newcomer. Moll is now a freshman at Ursinus College where he plays in the band.

Often referred to as the "mail order band" because of the method of recruiting members, the National FFA Band was first organized in 1947. Since that time competition for the honor of playing in the band has steadily increased. Under the direction of Roger Heath; Director of Virginia Tech Bands, the FFA Band has gained a reputation for its polished performances even though bandmen have

only two days of practice together prior to their first performance.

FFA members who play in the band arrive in Kansas City two days before the convention starts so they can begin practicing. "Although we send band members the more difficult music ahead of time, it still takes a lot of practice to get ready for our first performance on Wednesday morning," says Heath. "We spend six to eight hours Sunday afternoon and evening practicing the music and working out marching formations," he explains. "We also practice all Monday and Tuesday, and the rest of the week we keep in shape by short practice sessions and concert performances."

Although the FFA convention officially ended Friday evening the bandmen will not finish their week's work until noon Saturday at the conclusion of the American Royal Parade. Traditionally, the FFA Band has been featured as the leading marching unit in the parade which signals the end of the National FFA Convention and the opening of the American Royal Livestock and Horse Show.

**Pa. horses on top**

HARRISBURG - Pennsylvania horsemen ran away with the top awards in quarter horse competition at the Keystone International Livestock Exposition, taking all six major prizes.

Bob and Jane Rineer, Dallastown, York County, captured the grand champion and reserve grand champion stallion awards. Their three-year-old stallion, "Cool Class," was named grand champion and "Plain Trouble," their yearling colt, was reserve champion.

The grand champion mare, "Loot's Honey Bun," a two-year-old filly, was shown by the D Bar J Farm, Mifflinburg, Union County.

Reserve grand champion mare was "Eternal Elegance," a yearling filly shown by Tom and Sharon Burks, Mechanicsburg, Cumberland County.

Herman R. Ewell, East Earl, Lancaster County, showed the grand champion gelding, "Ultra Skip," a two-year-old. The reserve grand champion gelding, a four-year-old named "Sharp Sting," was shown by Cathy M. Pennypacker, Reading, Berks County.

Judy Sujansky, Somerset, Somerset County, was judged the Youth Activity Performance Champion. The reserve champion for Youth Activity Performance was Suzanne Peterson, Lancaster.
