### Poultry keeps rising

HARRISBURG - Pennsylvania poultry production continued to rise during the week ending October 30, according to the Pennsylvania Crop Reporting Service.

Placements of broiler chicks in the Commonwealth were 1,537,000. The placements were 20 per cent above the corresponding week a year ago and one per cent above the previous week.

Average placements during the past ten weeks were 20 per cent above a year earlier.

Placements in the 21 key poultry states were 52,645,000. This figure is eight per cent above the same week in 1975, but 12 per cent below the previous week.

Average placements in the 21 key poultry states during the report which will be made past ten weeks were nine per cent above a year ago.

## Ag survey announced

Farmers across the nation will be surveyed later this month and next by the Statistical Reporting Service of USDA to gather information for primary crop and livestock estimates.

The nationwide survey is designed to gather production intention and planting information for such key crops as winter wheat, hogs, chicks, pig and calf populations on farms, and initial intentions for

The information is collected on a voluntary and confidential basis and is published only as part of state and national summaries.

Information collected will be used as the basis of a 1977 winter wheat and hog must make.

production estimate on December 22nd; a poultry estimate to be released on January 28th, and cattle public on February 2nd.

Farmers are urged to cooperate with the Crop Reporting Service by providing the requested information. The national estimates to come out of the survey can play a valuable role in helping farmers decide how to respond to the current demand and supply situation. Should they plant more or less, expand or hold even in livestock operations, or perhaps is it wise to sell inventories now or hang on to them? . . . all these are questions which are key to the 1977 decisions farmers


