Increase small in ${ }^{7} 77$ food prices
WASHINGTON D.C. Large food supplies will help food prices during the first half of next year. That's the assessment of James Donald in remarks prepared for the Department of Agriculture's National Agricultural Outlook Conference recently in Washington. Donald, of he Department's Economic Research Service, says ncreasing consumer demand and rising marketing costs will keep upward pressure on food prices. But, retail food price in the first half of 1977 may average only around three per cent higher, similar to 976's rise.
Officials say prices for all of 1977 should also average three or four per cent above 1976, assuming expected output of meats and livestock products and barring surprises in next year's crops.
These percentages are minor in comparison with 1973 and 1974, and another eight per cent in and another eight per cent in 197. Dpnald will remain relatively steady this winter.
