

Berks COUNTY DHIA MONTHLY REPORT

Andrew Stoltzfus' "Daisy" captured the top spot in both milk and butterfat production for records completed in October. Beginning her lactation at age seven years and eight months, the registered Holstein tallied up a record of 26,583 pounds of milk and 1040 of butterfat. Taking second place in butterfat was Robert Seidel's "Lola," which chalked up a record of 23,637 pounds of milk and 1016 of butterfat. The reserve milk production crown went to Eleanor Siegried's "Fran," which tipped the scales at 26,096 pounds of milk and 953 of fat.

Meat production up

WASHINGTON, D.C. - U.S. commercial production of red meat totaled almost 3.5 billion pounds in October, up five percent more than a year ago and one percent above October 1974.

Total red meat production for January-October 1976 was up seven percent from 1975: Beef, was up nine percent; veal down two percent; pork, up four percent; lamb and mutton, down eleven percent. Commercial meat production includes slaughter in federally inspected and other plants, but excludes animals slaughtered on farms.

Beef production totaled over 2.2 billion pounds, three percent below October last year but two percent above October 1974. Cattle kill totaled 3,658,400 head, eight percent under last year and one percent over October 1974.

Seventy-five million pounds of veal were produced in October, 21 percent below the 95 million pounds for that month a year

ago. Calf slaughter at 480,200 head was down 19 percent from a year ago, but 28 percent over the October 1974 kill.

Pork production totaled nearly 1.2 billion pounds in October, 27 percent over a year ago but two percent under October 1974. Hog kill totaled 7,210,900 head, 28 percent above last year but three percent less than October 1974.

Organic Remains

The organic remains of the earliest plant, marine and animal life that existed between 400 million and 40 million years ago are the sources of the crude oil deposits now tapped by man to supply over 40 per cent of the world's total energy requirements.

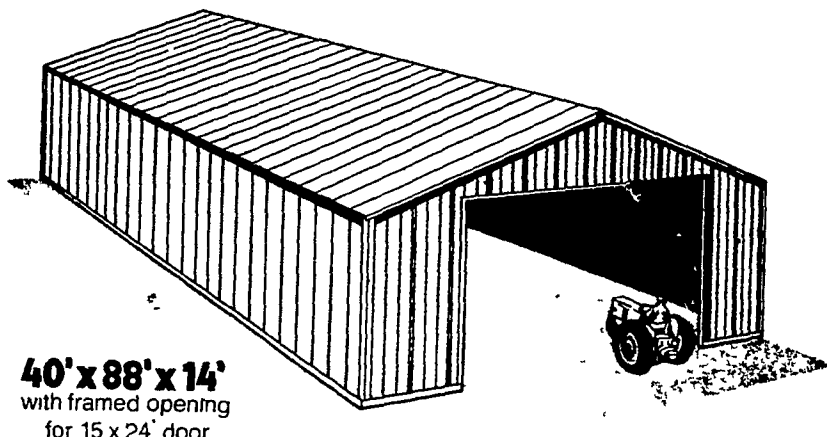
