

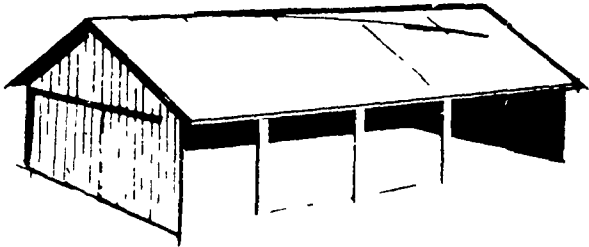

The meeting was on Safety and the guest speaker was Trooper Joseph R. Althoff of Troop J, the Lancaster State Police barracks. Trooper Althoff showed the women a film pertaining to "The Bunco Artist". The victims of bunco artists and resulting crimes are of no age or occupation limits; however, the principal victim is the elderly and the housewife. "Bunco" is a general term

covering a variety of fraud, deception, and theft-by-trick type crimes. Listed are a few safeguards to protect oneself when dealing with a bunco artist: practice the ancient law, "Buyer Beware" principle, and deal only with reputable, known business people, not a sales person who states he-she will be in the area for only a few days; when approached about your personal bank business, telephone your local banker, one that you personally know, and discuss with him-her your concern. Never discuss your savings or checking account numbers with a stranger.

If you think you have been a victim of a bunco artist, immediately telephone the police. The State Trooper also

reminded never to reveal the fact that you live alone; never indicate the fact that you're in your home alone; and in case of a signature to be written to a contract, request the contract remain with you until your husband, or family member reads the contract before your name is signed to it.

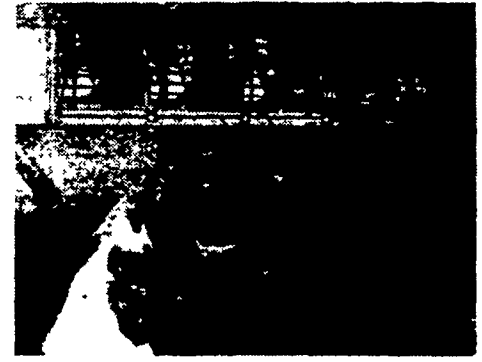

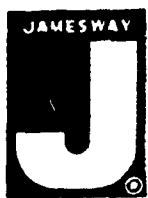
