Miss Ward, the 19-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Ward of LaMoille, Ill., has been serving the pork industry for two years in a promotional capacity. Two years ago she reigned as the Illinois pork queen which served as a preparation for the national title she now holds.

Since her crowning in Indianapolis on March 10 at the American Pork Congress. she has traveled across the country to promote pork on behalf of


the nation's producers. In her after-dinner speech to the Pennsylvania group, she told of some of her experiences on the radio and in personal appearances around the country.
