Conservation duties clarified

HARRISBURG - The Agriculture Advisory Committee to the Department of Environmental Resources on March 3 clarified the responsibilities for erosion and sedimentation control measures between the landowner and tenant farmer.

The recommendation, spelled out during the committee's regular meeting here in the Department of Agriculture Building, indicated that the landowner, or the absentee landlord, will be responsible for developing the plan and for the construction of any needed permanent type control structures. The tenant farmer will then be responsible for complying with the control plan.

Chester Heim, representing the Pennsylvania Farmers Association and newly elected chairman of the Agriculture Advisory Committee, presided when Afton Schadel, chief, division of Soil Resources and Erosion Control, DER's Bureau of Soil and Water Conservation, reported that a directory of soil erosion

and sedimentation control practices for agriculture has been developed and will be available within six months to a year.

The purpose of the directory, explained Schadel, is to provide information to landowners who choose to develop their own erosion and sedimentation control plan rather than receiving assistance through the local Conservation District.

The Education and Training Committee recommended that DER and The Pennsylvania State University Cooperative Extension Service should jointly prepare a program for disseminating information on the manure management manual. This training type of program would be carried out at meetings within the agricultural community.

A report from the Sewage Sludge Application Committee noted that this group is currently developing a manual on sewage sludge application to agricultural lands that would meet DER guidelines.

James Benson, of the Bureau of Air Quality and Noise Control, announced that consideration is being given revisions to air quality regulations that would exempt farming practices to a certain extent. He said that DER does not feel the proposed exemptions being considered by the Environmental Quality Board will adversely affect Pennsylvania's air quality standards.

Eugene Eisenbise, director, Bureau of Environmental Master Planning, announced that guidelines are being developed on implementation of the Environmental Master Plan and urged the agricultural group to take an

active part in implementing the guidelines in order to ensure the preservation of prime agricultural land in the Commonwealth.

The next committee meeting is slated for May 5, at 9 a.m., at the Pennsylvania Farmers Association headquarters, Camp Hill.

Bargaining bill up

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Rep. B. F. Sisk (D. - Calif.) has re-introduced his proposal to amend and strengthen the Agricultural Fair Practices Act of 1968. (The bill number is H.R. 3792.) According to his staff, the bill is the same as last year. One of the key provisions of the proposal is to make it a prohibited practice "to refuse to bargain in good faith with an association of producers producing under contract which has been certified by the Secretary of Agriculture."

The amendments would set criteria for the Secretary

to use in certifying a bargaining association. Among the requirements is that the association represent at least 50 per cent of the number of producers of the commodity in a given "major area" or represent at least 50 per cent of the volume of the commodity in the major area. A major area is defined as "... a single state or an area of production which is readily identified by past practices and which produces at least 25 per cent of the total volume of a commodity in a single state..."

Energy bill introduced

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Sen. Herman Talmadge, (D. - Ga.) Chairman of the Senate Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition and Forestry, has introduced a bill (S. 745) which provides a priority system for certain agricultural uses of natural gas. The Bill, which would amend the Natural Gas Act, has been referred to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources.

According to the Senator, the bill would provide a natural gas priority for essential agricultural purposes second only to the needs of existing residential and small commercial users. It would include fertilizer and agricultural chemical production, food and fiber

processing and packaging, crop drying, and irrigation. It would also apply to those activities related to plant protection, processing, and feed - stock requirements. It would apply to both interstate and intrastate gas supplies.
