

COLLEGE PARK Md. -Some fields of winter oats, barley and wheat still look dubious, reports Joseph L. Newcomer, Extension agronomist at the University of Maryland, here.

Newcomer urges farmers to check their fields carefully and make a decision within the next week or two about possible replanting to another crop.

If it hasn't been done already, immediate topdressing with a high nitrogen fertilizer is also recommended. This procedure will give zip to the developing small grain, and it will be of benefit even if the field is replanted to corn. Apply at the rate of 30 to 40 pounds of actual nitrogen per

There is one exception tothis advice, however, Newcomer warned. Don't top-dress a field with highnitrogent fertilizer if you have definite plans to replant with long-season soybeans.

The Maryland Extension specialist offered this ruleof-thumb for farmers trying to decide whether they

should replant a field of Newcomer cautioned. If the than six per square foot, small grain:

Don't replant if there seems to be a populaiton of at least 112 plants per square foot. Even a population as low as six plants per square foot might make a decent crop of oats, barley or wheat under ideal circumstnees with plenty of fertilizer, he commented.

Replanting with Spring wheat is not recommended anywhere in Maryland.

Spring barley is not recommened for any area of the state except Garret and Allegheny Counties, he notes, and Spring oats should be planted only north and west of a line between Washington, D. Baltimore and Elkton. But even in these areas, the Spring seeding should be done immediately.

Otherwise, corn and soybeans are the recommended crops where it is deemed advisable to replant fields of small grain.

A final factor to consider in making a decision to replant Winter-damaged small grain is the weed situation,

current population of newly emerged perennial and annual weeds like garlic, corncolke or cowcockle, ragged-robin, corn. chamomile, chichweed, kawel (German moss), daisies and dogfennel

forget about tryng to save the small grain.

Rather, make plans to control the weeds by diking an application of proper herbicides in connection with plans to grow corn or soybeans in the affected (maywweed) numbers more field.






