

PSU livestock show slated

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. — The 60th Little International Livestock Exposition is scheduled for April 30 at the Campus Ice Pavilion, Penn State University, here. The show will begin at 8 a.m. and there is no admission charge.

Members of the Block and Bridle Club sponsor the event, patterned after the former Chicago International Livestock Exposition.

Sixty beef cattle, 42 pigs, 37 sheep, and 18 horses have been selected at random by

students who then begin scrubbing, clipping, brushing, leading, and training. By April 30, both the animals and the students are ready for the competition. Champions are chosen in each species and overall. Awards are presented at a banquet which follows the show at 6:30 p.m.

The banquet will honor the man for whom the 60th Little International is dedicated—Richard Kuzemchek, University shepherd; and the 1977 Distinguished Alumnus of the Department of Dairy and Animal Science, Dr. James Christian of the University of Georgia.

The Exposition was founded in 1917 by Peter B. MacKenzie, a former superintendent of livestock at the University. The "Little International" differs from the Chicago show in that it is judged on the student's performance in fitting and showing animals rather than the animal's merits. The show offers a learning experience to the participants and an enjoyable day to the spectators.

What's new

When the Port-a-Bale is full, the tongue swings to the center position and the bales are lifted to travel height.

For rear loading, the rear stop bar is rotated and the pickup rails are spread and lowered. The bales are

picked up by backing under them. Unloading is as effortless as loading.

While being carried, the bale position remains unchanged from field to storage and waste from dropoff is held at a minimum.

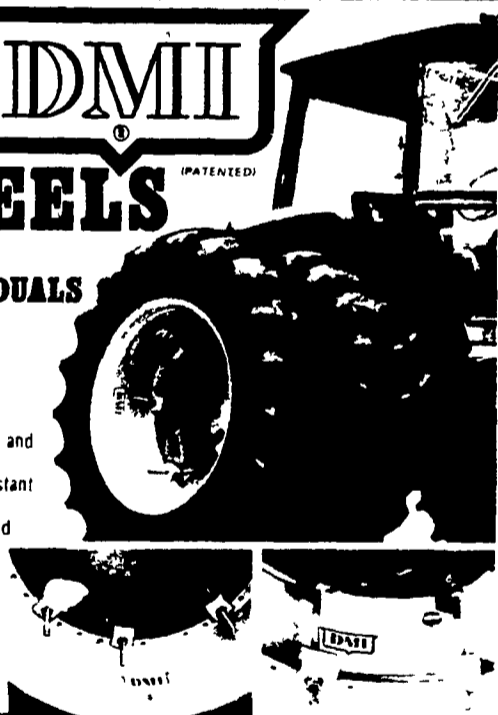

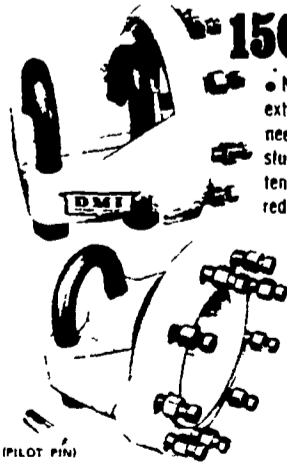

Loans for all 1977 crop commodities will be subject to a six per cent interest rate for the regular loan period.

The interest rate on outstanding storage facility and drying equipment loans which were subject to variable interest rates, also were reduced April 1 from 7 1/2 per cent to seven per cent. Loans made on or after April 1 will bear interest at the seven per cent rate for the period they are outstanding.

This announcement changes the policy of adjusting interest rates every six months on outstanding loans, but it continues the policy of setting rates at a level sufficient to recover the Commodity Credit Corporation's cost of borrowing money from the U. S. Treasury.

In addition to the lower

rates, this loan program increases the maximum amount to be loaned, broadens items which may be included for a loan, and decreases the down payment required.

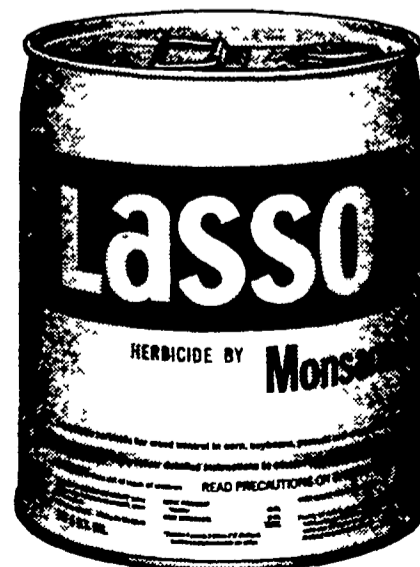
The maximum loan amount is being increased from \$25,000 to \$50,000. New provisions for loans also include provisions to add concrete and wiring cost for structures and drying equipment, and only a 15 per cent down payment instead of the previous 30 per cent.

In determining the amount of the loan, storage needs will be based on two years' farm production, instead of one year's production, as was required before these changes.

These changes and the lowered interest rate of seven per cent will remain constant for the term of the loan.
