Seed and garden program expands

HARRISBURG, Pa. -Agriculture Secretary Kent D. Shelhamer has announced the expansion of the Governor's Anti-Inflationary Seed and Garden Program for the 1977 growing season. Letters outlining the availability of seeds, garden plots, and technical advice have gone out from his office to schools and Parent Teacher Associations in Pennsylvania, Shelhamer

The expansion effort was undertaken in cooperation with the State Department of Education through discussions with Acting Secretary of Education Robert Hendershot, declared Shelhamer. In all, all, letters went to 4604 schools, as well es to 1500 Parent Teacher Associations.

The letters stressed potential savings to families through correct usage of seeds, fertilizer and pesticides. Shelhamer said a savings of up to \$250 was possible for the average Pennsylvania family participating in the program.

The Agriculture Secretary also said that personnel from his department's Bureau of Plant Industry would furnish information on environmentally safe and agriculturally sound practices in the use of pesticides to those taking part in this year's program.

Shelhamer indicated that response from students, faculty members, and PTA members has been "excellent and should bring the sale of seed packets this year to the highest point since the program began in 1975".

Under the program guidelines, Pennsylvanians may purchase seed packets containing ten varieties of vegetables through the Department of Agriculture at substantial savings over commercial prices, said Shelhammer. He added that in some cases, land at state institutions may be made available for use by gardeners at no cost.

Shelhamer cited the hard Winter of 1977 as reason enough for more Pennsylvanians to take an interest in anti-inflation gardening. He also praised Department of Education and Acting Secretary Hendershot for "responding quickly and effectively cooperative effort to make the Governor's program more wide-reaching and beneficial to Commonwealth residents"

Walter Bucks, part-time aniculturist with 80 hives, feels this concern is unjustified and has been taken out of proportion. "African bee semen has been in our country for approximately 17 years," he notes. But no one

more docile bees when crossing the "Africanized bees" with less aggressive strains. Some of these apiculturists do admit, however, that they have had change some of their handling techniques.

Bucks told Lancaster Farming that the same is the few with true "Africanized bees" already found in our country. These bees have been crossed with less aggressive strains for several generations and do not pose any significant problems."

If aggressive bees do have found ways to produce happen to migrate north from Brazil, Bucks feels certain that they can be deal with before they pose any more problems than the bees being raised now. Con. tinuing, Bucks said, "Let's not forget the isolated cases where domestic bees have been known to cause severe problems to a few people already." Some people have acute allergic reations to bee stings as with everything else. It's just that overly concerned people have unfortunately blown the African bee problems out of proportion."
