

FLEMINGTON, N.J. - As a meat and egg producer, the chicken is an extraordinary animal. The modern bird produces an average of 230-240 eggs a year. Twenty five normal diet to a low energy years ago it took seven pounds of feed to produce a dozen eggs. Today we only need four pounds.


