SHINGTON, D.C. - A seller or shipper does not ge in the U.S. grain have enough grain on hand that qualifies for the grade required in the sales contract, he can substitute, without separate certification, an unlimited amount of grain that qualifies for a higher grade. For example, if an exporter in the Pacific Northwest has to use No. 1 Western White Wheat to fill a contract

calling for No. 2, he can ask the inspector to certify the lot as "U.S. No. 2 or better Western White Wheat," and meet the contract grade requirement. Under previous rules, the exporter would have had to accept a grade certificate for U.S. No. 1 Western White Wheat and

buyer that the wheat sold did not meet the contract grade. Grain exporters and other interested parties have advised officials of USDA's Federal Grain Inspection Service (FGIS) - and FGIS concurs - that delivery of a higher grade of grain than that specified in the sales contract should not be objectionable to foreign buyers


