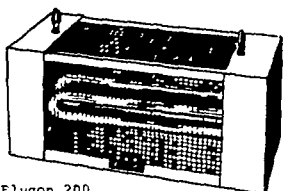
### WHAT'S NEW

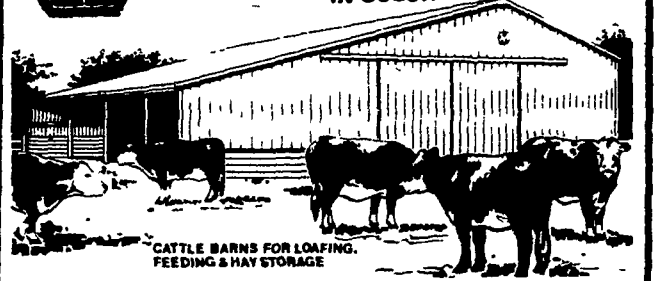
