WASHINGTON, D.C. - Representatives of governments of four major wheat exporting countries recently concluded a two-day meeting in Washington to discuss international wheat matters.

The meeting dealt primarily with an exchange of views about possible elements of a proposed new international agreement including both importing and exporting countries. The agenda also included a review of the current and prospective world wheat situation, and an exchange of views with respect to the current size of world wheat stocks and the general depressed condition of world wheat prices. The participating countries were Argentina, Australia, Canada, and the United States.
