How can those who worry about hunger in other countries ignore the injustice of keeping American farmers down to a poverty level? American farmers are getting about the lowest prices, and the lowest levels of price support from their government of any farmers in any country in the world.

The new farm bill also gives Congressional sanction to the principle of the Carter Administration's "reserve" program, which Mr. Jantzen praises for helping protect the hungry overseas against shortages of food.

The "joker" for farmers in this grain reserve plan is that it will not protect farmers from the pricedepressing effect of surpluses.

The "special farmer-held reserve" plan Mr. Jantzen mentions, and which has been given all the publicity, will account for only a few hundred million bushels of the total "surplus" of grain. There will be more than three billion bushels of grain on hand out of this year's and earlier crops when this marketing year is over and a new harvest is ready to start in 1978. Another big crop in 1978 will make the burden of the surplus outside the token little "special reserve" much worse still.

Some of this "surplus" outside the special reserve will be stored at the farmer's own expense - if and so long as he can get along without income with which to pay his bills. But farmers who have to have ready cash will have




