Children need breakfast

DOVER, DEL.—Extension nutrition specialists tell us that too many children head for school with little or no breakfast under their belts. This is not only foolish, but it can promote poor eating habits.

Breakfast is important for growing youngsters. Teenagers, in fact, often grow so rapidly that their bodies get all tucked out. Thus they require extra sleep as well as plenty of nutritious food.

The body is refreshed after a night's sleep, but it needs refueling also. From dinner to breakfast could span 12 hours or more. Skipping breakfast adds several more hours to the fast, and the body can run pretty low on go-power in that time.

Breakfast provides nutrients that may not be furnished adequately by

other meals. These include Vitamin C from fruit, and calcium, riboflavin and other nutrients from milk.

Breakfast also helps restore the glucose level in the blood, which drops after several hours without food and can result in the blahs. Then there is the matter of performance at school. Studies have shown that youngsters who've eaten breakfast are more alert, more productive, and better behaved than those who haven't.

According to extension nutritionists, breakfast should include milk, whole-grain cereal or equivalent, and fruit. Add any extras that calories, time and the budget permit.

Whole wheat pancakes or waffles are a cinch when the batter is mixed and refrigerated the night before.

Moist, fragrant bran muffins can be baked ahead and reheated quickly in the oven.

Natural foods cookbooks are full of recipes for crunchy, home-made granola. One can make it special with nuts and raisins, dates or apricots.

Open-face sandwiches will tempt even the most confirmed sleepyhead. Top-toasted English muffin halves with bacon (fried the night before), a slice of tomato and a slice of cheese, all to be slipped under the broiler. Or one can cover buttered rye toast with thin slices of ham or Canadian bacon, and a poached egg.

Fried apple rings and sausages are made for each other. So is French toast with hot applesauce between the slices.

Make-ahead creamed chipped beef on split corn-bread squares provides lots of cheer on a chilly morning. So do eggs haked in corned beef hash cups.

When one has planned a week's worth of marvelous menus, carry it a step further. A person can make the breakfast table look inviting with colorful mats, bright napkins, a potted geranium.
