Sunshine means hard work on Belgian farms

Editor's Note: The following is a newsletter prepared by Nancy Henkel, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Henkel, Winterhill Road, Strasburg, who is a delegate from Lancaster County to Belgium in the International 4-H Youth Exchange. The International 4-H Youth Exchange is conducted by the National 4-H Council on behalf of the Cooperative Extension Service Friends of 4-H in Lancaster County, the 4-H Council, 4-H clubs, service clubs, Farm Women groups and agri-business organizations assist in financing this exchange. This is the third in a series which Nancy will write from Belgium, her host country.

Since I have portrayed the social life here in Belgium, you might be wondering if I do any work! Well the truth is that I do a lot of work when the sun shines. Since Belgium has about 270 days of rain per year you can guess how much sun I have seen since I've been here.

My first host family, Taelman lived on a 250 acre farm. When I arrived, it was sugar beet weeding time.

With close to 100 acres of sugar beets to be weeded by hand and hoe, it can't be hard to imagine that I spent three weeks in the beet fields. We worked six days a week, nine hours per day! The Taelman family also has 1500 head of Landrace swine. Unfortunately for me, it was almost completely mechanized and I did not have too much contact with that department.

The Boes family was my second host and lived only 25 kilometers from the Taelman family. On my second farm they had 450 acres of grain crops, sugarbeets, string beans, and alfalfa. When the harvesting of the wheat began, I became actively involved in baling straw on 200 acres. Baling 9000 bales of straw seemed to take an eternity, and it's true when I say we baled from 8:00 a.m. until midnight. It is necessary to work long hours because of the constant fear of rain delaying the work. This year the production was down because of too much rain - the combines were unable to get into the fields. In August we had three weeks of rain,

making it impossible to do any harvesting.

Before I saw the end of the 9000 bales I moved to my third host family, Cloos, about 150 kilometers south of my first two families. The farm I am on presently is a dairy farm, with 30 head of milking cows and 125 acres of grain crops, potatoes and corn. When I arrived, there was the familiar sight of the wagons stacked with straw! After a week and a half of straw, we finished. On this farm I have the added dimension of helping with the milking. I have taken over feeding the calves.

When the straw was finished we began the harvesting of potatoes. I am learning to quickly separate the stones from the potatoes - the machine doesn't know how to work slowly!! When the potatoes are finished we will begin making corn silage. And shortly after the corn silage I will be on my way home to Lancaster County.

With my third family I have had the experience of

making butter and cottage cheese. Every Thursday they sell the various dairy and poultry products at the market. Since I understand the French language well enough to make change I take part in selling the products also.

Even though I have enjoyed the social life I have also put in many hours of "on the job training." Again, I would like to thank all the sponsors of the IFVE program and I am anxious to share my experience with the people back home in Lancaster County.
