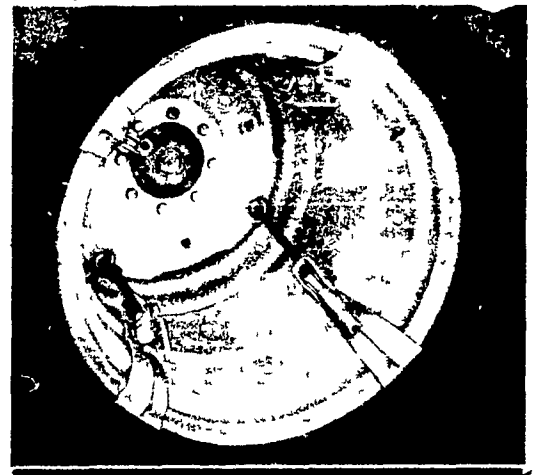

Combine Duals

**Don't leave
crops in the field**

Combines without duals will, in many cases, leave crops unharvested in the fields. You can walk back through your fields and add up your losses.

Headers cannot adjust rapidly enough to get an even cut without duals. With soybeans for example, one wheel is on the ridge row and one wheel in the center of the row. This causes the header to be at an angle, with the result that only part of the crop is harvested.



**Work wet fields
sooner**

A dualled combine has its weight spread over nearly twice the area of a combine with single wheels. This increased weight distribution allows you to work wet fields sooner, when its often more profitable.
