Narvon R1. Miss Martin had also taken the championship title of the Ephrata Fair this Fall with the 1210 pound purebred.

The reserve champion of the lightweight division was a 1135 pound steer shown by Neil Bushong of Columbia R3.

In the sale of the 93 head which followed the show, the champion sold for \$2.24 per pound or a total of \$2520 to James Mummau, owner of the Lancaster County Farm Restaurant, Elizabethtown R1. This year marks the sixth year that Mummau has either purchased the grand or reserve grand champion of this district show. He plans, once again, to serve the beef on New Years Day.

The reserve champion was sold to W. E. Kreider, Inc., a butcher with retail stores at Stauffers of Kissel Hill for .85 cents per pound.

The 93 head sold by auctioneer Wilbur Hosler averaged \$52.96 per hundredweight with the average weight 1151 pounds.

Buyer of the reserve heavyweight champion was Farmers Fertilizer Works, Inc., Elizabethtown, and the reserve lightweight champion, Watt and Shand, Lancaster and Park City.

# Serv-O-Matic

The Model 101 Serv-O-Matic may be mounted through the wall in a loose housing system or through the fence line for open lots. Side braces are also provided for mounting and installation.

The feeder opening is designed to permit only one cow to eat at a time. A 2 inch auger drops approximately 1 lb. of concentrate per minute into the feeder. This is the same rate the cow eats. No feed remains in the feeder when she moves away.

A simple magnet around the cow's neck will activate the feeder motor as she places her head into the feeder. Cows without a magnet are unable to get feed.
