Along with this property, the 60 other Century Farms which were honored on Monday evening included the following list. A brief description of each farm is included:

Bailey, Eusebius-farm in Pocopson Township along Lenape-Unionville Road with Pocopson Creek passing through the property; the 131-acre farm has been in the family since 1873.

Barnard, Richard W. and Samuel M. — 74—acre farm in Newlin Township near Northbrook has been in continuous ownership in the same family since the early 1700's

Beaver, J. Lynford-100 acre farm on Seven Stars Road, Kimberton, has been in the Beaver family - Dallett, Alfred Jr.-Known since 1846.

Bitler, Robert F. and Mary A. – a 41-acre farm south of Pottstown has been in the Kimes-Bitler family since 1844. The original owner, David Kimes was a bishop in the Church of the Brethren. His ancestors were instrumental in establishing the church in

America.
Brosius, Charles C. and Jane
S. – 143- acre farm has
been in the Pusey-Brosius

family since 1853; at first was a general farming and dairy farm, but in 1910 mushrooms were introduced and mushrooms are now the main crop.

Cochran, Robert F. – 115acre farm has been in the
same family since
James, Stpehen, and
David Cochran acquired
the farm through a Penn
grant of 1744. The
youngest Cochran (13
years old) on the farm is
the eighth generation to
live on the farm. Located
in Cochranville.

Cowan, Mr. and Mrs. Everett--this 100-acre farm is also a land grant from William Penn and has been in the Cowan family near Parkesburg since that time.

Dallett, Alfred Jr.-Known as the Squire Tom Cheyney farm, this 128-acre farm at 1255 Cheyney Road has been in the Dallett family since 1875.

Darlington, William E. and David W. - 90-acre farm in Pocopson has been in the Darlington family since 1851.

Elliott, Ronald F. and Shirley L. -- Ten generations of Elliotts have lived on this farm in East Coventry Township since 1769; 101 acres.

Fisher, Elwood R. and Thelma E. – 92-acre farm outside Phoenixville was purchased by the Fisher family in 1876.

Garvine, Walter and Sara –
100-acre Uwchlan
Township farm was
purchased by the
Smedley-Garvine family
in 1866 The house on the
property was built in 1854.
Guest, Vernon R. and LaRue

P. - the Guest family came to America from Wales in 1681 and settled a land grant from William Penn. The present 143-acres was purchased by Follest Guest in 1852. The present farm is only a half-mile from the Penn grant. Located just south of Pottstown.

Hallman, Harold M. - 60 acre farm in Chester Springs has been in the Hallman family since about 1840. The barn on the property was once used as a stop on the underground railway for slaves.

Handy, William P. and Ruth
Hope Handy – known as
Hopedell Farm, this 105acre farm is located near
Coatesville; farm was a
Penn Grant of Dec. 22,
1743, to Thomas Hope
whose family came from
Yorkshire, England.

Eight generations have lived on the farm; the second owner, Robert Hope was killed at the Battle of Brandywine.

Harvey Estate: owners
Martha Turtle, Enos H.
Harvey and Elizabeth
Patterson – known as
Spring Grove Farm; 141acres located in Atglen.
In the Harvey family
since 1816.

Hoffman, John R. and Ruth K. – 73 acres in Uwchlan Township; in family since 1864; an old fertilizer mill was operated there at one time.

Hutchinson, Mrs. Mabel Lubkens Hutchison and J. Lukens Hutchinson property is divided into two farms; property has been in family since 1755; 85 acres and 136 acres; near West Grove

Jones, Harry F. and Julia A.

– 109 acres on North
Birdell Road near
Honeybrook; seven
generations of Jones have
lived on this farm.

Kelleher, Mary and John – 24 acres on Sharp Road, Avondale.

Kimble, John W. and Dorothy C. – 175 purchase in 1823; located near Nottingham.

Kirk, Harry S. - 62 acres in West Nottingham Township; has been in the Kirk family since 1855.

Kolle, Miriam, John and Barbara – 111.5 acres on Star Route, Pottstown, has been in the Keim (Miriam Kolee's maiden name) family since 1781; was originally a part of Richard Penn's land holdings; farm currently produces beef and crops.

Krueger, Jane Morris Krueger, Rebecca Jane, Phoebe E. Krueger McElhenny — 39 acres near Honeybrook; farm developed by Jane Morris Krueger's great-grandfather John Piersol who was a carpenter and farmer.

Kulp, Joseph I. and Irvin H. - 60 acres on Route 22
near Phoenixville; has
been in the family since
1844.

Landefield, Mr. and Mrs.
William Robert - 136
acres known as Oakdale
Farm near Kennett
Square; Mrs. Landefeld's
family (The Clouds) have
owned the farm in East
Marlborough Township
since Colonial times.

Latshaw, Russell - 55 acre dairy farm which has been in the Latshaw family since about 1850; known as Sunny Slope Dairies; Located in Spring City.

Light, David and Annabelle - 115 acre farm in
Cochranville has been in

the Light family since 1859; known as Lightacre Farm; Leroy Light and son David were active members of the Interstate Milk Producers and shipped Golden Guernsey Milk to Abbotts Dairy for more than 56 years.

Marshall, Warren H. – farm has been in the Harrison-Marshall family since 1842; located in Lyndell.

Martin, T. Edwin – 58 acres known as Misty Pines near West Grove; farm composed of pastures, cropland and woods; deeds for this property date back to William Penn; has been in Martin family since 1793.

McAffee, Mrs. Sylvia and son, Thomas E. – 196 acres near Glenmoore has been in family since 1796. Barn on the property dates back to 1797.

McDowell, Mrs. Dorothy B. - 90 acres near West Grove; has been in the family since 1790.

McFarlan, Charles W. - 3000
acres near Downingtown; ¶
farm founded by William
McFarlan who came to
America from Edinburgh, Scotland; he is
buried behind the farm
house.

Millard, Jonathan — 89 acres in West Nantmeal Township; the present owner, Jonathan Millard is 80 years old and is the fourth generation of Millards to own property.
