Heavy snow caused the partial collapse of two roofs in the Penryn-Elm area last weekend, one over a horse barn and riding arena, the other on a high-rise chicken

On Tuesday, work was already started by contractors to pull up the roof over the barn and arena at Lower Hopewell Horse Center, owned by Mr. and Mrs. John Farrington, Speedwell Forge Road, Lititz. Owners of the other immediately.

damaged property, Ralph Myer & Sons, Airy Hill Road, Manheim R5, are going to use a crane to try to lift the roof over the chicken house. but are uncertain if this will

The damage at the Farrington riding arena was discovered after lunch time last Sunday. Mrs. Farrington said the family had been working in the arena that morning, and speculates the collapse must have occurred about noon.

She said that neighbors and members of the Brickerville Fire Company helped shovel snow off the roof for about three hours that day.

The roof went down about four feet, pushing back a wall of the arena in the section where it joins the barn, Mrs. Farrington said.

JUST ARRIVED

Nineteen horses are kept in the barn, including some boarded there by other owners. Mrs. Farrington said her husband and daughter, 11-year old Alida, got the horses out of the barn

She said a second section of roof, this part over the barn, collapsed while Alida was still inside. However, it was stopped by a haystack and the girl was frightened but not injured, she said.

Mrs. Farrington said they are now able to put the horses back in the barn at

At the Ralph Myer chicken farm at Elm, the roof over a 57,000 bird chicken house collapsed and came to rest on the top tier of one of the decks of cages, caught there by wooded trusses that broke.

An uneven snow load on the roof appears to be the cause of the collapse, Myer's son said. He said the collapse occured sometime during the night Friday a week ago and was discovered early Saturday morning.

Only about two dozen chickens were killed, those in the cages crushed by the trusses, he said.

He said the birds on the top tier of one deck were pulled out, and the other birds were not affected by the collapse. He said the equipment in the chicken house is working all rıght.

Penryn Fire Company shoveled snow off the roof. and also took most of the snow off the roof of another chicken house, that contains 33,000 birds.
