

Pa. delegate stresses unity at NFU convention

attended the 76th annual convention of the National Farmers Union, here, demonstrating, in the words of one, "our need to unify as farmers and work together on the national level."

Albert H. Mellinger of Strasburg, Pa., chairman of the board of Pennsylvania Farmers Union, stressed the need for broad cooperation among farmers.

"What's good for the grain farmer in turn is good for the dairyman or the cattle farmer," said Mellinger. The Pennsylvania Farmers


