UNIVERSITY PARK -Gamma Sigma Delta, the honor society of agriculture, cited outstanding alumni, faculty, and students recently during the chapter's annual banquet at Penn

Honored for exceptional service in research with the College of Agriculture was Dr. Philip G. Keeney, professor of food science. Cited for outstanding work as a teacher was Dr. Paul R. Shellenberger, professor of dairy science. Honors for achievements in Extension programs went to Dr. W. Wayne Hinish, professor of agronomy extension.

Alumni honored for attainments, and taken into membership, were Wayne C. Handwerk of Camden, N.Y., manager of agricultural operations for the Campbell Soup Company; and Arthur Nesbitt of Fort Atkinson, Wis., president and chief exeuctive officer of Nasco International.

Eileen J. Burke, senior in animal science from Butler, received the undergraduate scholarship award of a watch. Cash scholarships of \$50 each went to James L. Claghorn, State College, junior in animal science, and to Bruce R. Knoebel, Pittsburgh, junior in forest science.

Sophomore scholarship awards of pen and pencil sets were presented to James T. Elwell, Harwinton, Conn., major in animal science; and Lori F. Fehr, Pine Grove, and Judy A. Howe, Erie, both majoring in horticulture.

#### 7000 pound modified


