WASHINGTON, D.C. -Revised federal shipping rules are being proposed in an effort to halt the interstate spread of pseudorabies in swine, according to F.J. Mulhern, administrator of the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

A series of regional meetings are being planned to help explain the proposed shipping rules to farmers and other segments of the swine industry and to get their comments on the new regulations. The meetings will be held approximately 30 days following publication

This revolutionary processing development involves heating milk to temperatures ranging from 275° to 300°F, from two to eight seconds, then rapidly cooling it.
