

## Winners named in livestock competition

YORK - The Junior Livestock Field Day was held at Penn State on June 17. The program started out with a Judging Contest with 23 counties represented and approximately 165 members participating in the contest. James Caudill, Airville R2, was high individual with a score of 387 out of 400; second place was Lisa Dobrosky, Glen Rock R2, with 375; Diane Krouse, Lehigh County was third with 371; Chris Sunday, York R1, was tied for fourth place with 369; and Brian Utz, Hanover R2, was tenth with 363.

In the Swine Derby, Steve Trosle, Red Lion R2, placed fourth. In the Beef Showmanship Contest, David Wise, Spring Grove R2, was second in the first group of showmen 14 years and up. In the second group of Senior Showmen, Terri Lehigh was second, East Berlin R2; and Chris Klinedinst, Wrightsville R1, was third. In the third group of Senior Showmen, Leroy Bowles, Red Lion R5, was second. First Place Senior Showman was Dale Reigns, Mercer County; second was Bob Hess, Lancaster County; third was Terri Lehigh, East Berlin R2; David Wise, Spring Grove R2, was fourth; Leroy Bowles, Red Lion R5 was fifth. In the first group of the Junior Division, Chris Shive, Seven Valleys

R1, was third; and Jim Caldwell, Windsor R1, was fifth. Second group in the Junior Division, Bob Livingston, Dover, was first; Tammy Eisenhour, Wellsville R1, was third; and Bill Wise, Spring Grove R2 was fourth.

The top five Junior Showman was Chad Cash, Centre County; second place went to Bob Livingston, Dover; and third place was Tammy Eisenhour, Wellsville R1; Chris Shive, Seven Valleys R1, was fourth.

In the sheep Showman contest, Susan Janney,

Brodbecks R1, was first in the Jr. Division; Mark Ebaugh, Delta R2, was second; and Shane Sidenstricker, York was third. In the Senior Division, Laurie Dobrosky, Glen Rock R2 was first; Jon Janney, Brodbeck R1 was second; and Charla Janney, Brodbeck R1 was fifth. The champion sheep showman was Laurie Dobrosky, Glen Rock R2; and reserve champion showman was Jonathan Janney, Brodbeck R1. The rest of the program was on mini-workshops on the different phases of livestock management.

## Ayrshire breeder award given

BRANDON, Vt. - The Ayrshire Breeders' Association announced that Harold R. Kulp, Pottstown, qualified for his second Constructive Breeders Award during 1977. The award is presented each year.

In winning this award, the Kulp Ayrshire Herd maintained a mature equivalent production average of 14437 pounds of milk and 564 pounds of butterfat, and had an average classification score of '84.0' on 19 head of cattle.

Twenty-six Ayrshire Breeders nationwide qualified for this prestigious award in 1977.

The Constructive Breeders Award is presented by the Ayrshire Breeders' Association to honor Ayrshire Breeders enrolled on the Official DHIR testing program and who regularly have their herds classified for type. To qualify, the majority of the Registered Ayrshires in the herd must be bred by the owner and they must maintain a high level of type and production.

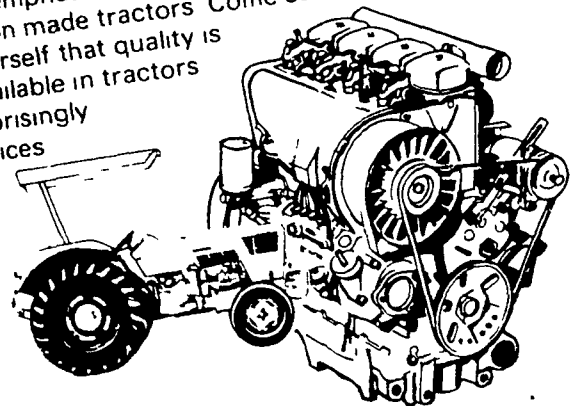
