Slaughter steer and heifer prices worked downward early but the sharpest break occurred Wednesday in hand with a lower dressed beef trade and some increease in the early week rate of slaughter. Some local packers continued out of the market due to plant renovation and vacations Slaughter Steers made up approximately 48 per cent of the total week's receipts, heifers 29 per cent with a fair percentage choice included. Cows comprised 13 per cent and feeders 6 per cent of the week's total.

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

Last year, Furman Farms was the Pennsylvania State Tomato Yield Champion for machine-harvested tomatoes Manager Jim Kohl reports, "With whole-pack tomatoes, anthracnose and early blight will affect your grade tremendously We have been on a full-season Bravo program since 1974 Last year we won the state yield title and had the highest grades we've had with machine harvest lattribute a lot of that to our Bravo program We start our Bravo program in June then we make 6 to 8 sprays during the season"

Joseph Nicolosi, The Sarah Nicolosi & Sons Farm, Swedesboro, New Jersey.

"We grow 100 acres of process tomatoes, all machine-harvested, and we've been

on a full-season Bravo program for about three years," says Mr Joseph Nicolosi "With our Bravo program, we definitely get better yields. And we control anthracnose better, close to 100% since we've gone to Bravo Our grades are excellent 95 to 100 percent saleable tomatoes"

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
