Field crops still behind schedule

days were suitable for fieldwork across the state in the week ending August 21, according to the Penn-sylvania Crop Reporting Service. The increased heat and reduced rainfall was welcomed but high humidity continued to plague drydown of hay and unharvested small grains. Seasonal harvesting of fruits and vegetables continued.

Soil moisture levels declined to mostly adequate. The most frequent reports of surplus levels were from southern counties, but those were limited to one fourth of the area's reporters.

At 37 per cent in dough and a slight bit dented, corn continued at five days behind the 48 per cent in dough stage a year ago. One half of the crop was in dough in the south, 35 per cent in central counties and 31 per cent in the north. Each area reported less than five per cent on ensilage corn cut to date. Japanese beetle and stalk borer damage seemed fairly prevelent. Growers continued to view the crop with optimism.

Through last week potatoes were 16 per cent dug, the same as last year. The northern counties report 14 per cent dug with central and southern reports at 18 per cent. Some blight, aphid, leaf hopper and Colorado potato bettle problems continue to be reported.

Combining of oats was 69 per cent complete. This lags the 94 per cent of last year by weedy fields.

ten days. The north was 62 per cent done, central counties were at 71 per cent, while the south at 82 per cent showed the least progress last week. Harvest was hindered by lodging and

complete, Fall plowing was four days behind the 18 per cent a year ago. The north had 11 per cent done, central counties were at 12 per cent, while 16 per cent had been done in the south.

Hay quality improved slightly last week and was rated as mostly fair. Alfalfa second cut was 82 per cent done with 23 per cent having been cut a third time. A year

With only 12 per cent ago the third cutting stood at 42 per cent. Clo-tim second cutting was 53 per cent done, ten per cent behind a year ago. Although the weather was better to mow hay, the humidity continued to be too high for good curing.

Tobacco was about five per cent harvested. This was ten days behind the 18 per cent done a year ago. As with hay, curing is expected to be a problem.


consists of seven different parts. The contestants must

The top two students from this contest are now eligible to represent Berks County on October 12 in the Berks-Lebanon-Schuylkill County


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
