

Dairy contest results posted for Cecil County, Md. Fair

FAIR HILL, Md. — Eric Knutsen, Rising Sun, Md., knows how to fit and show dairy cattle. He proved it at the Cecil County Fair, which was held here last month. Winning the showmanship and fitting contest in his age

group (seniors) was the first in a series of accomplishments during the dairy shows. When it was all over, he was named all breeds showing and fitting champion.

Becky Frederick, Not-

tingham, Pa., was named senior champion showman and fitter for Jersey exhibitors. Lisa Davis, Earleville, took the Guernsey title among juniors, while Glenn Davis, Earleville, captured the honor in the senior division and then went on to be named champion. The champion fitter and showman among junior Holstein exhibitors was Freddie Schrader of Earleville.

JERSEYS

Becky Frederick of Nottingham won nearly every blue ribbon in this contest, coming away with first place entries in the junior calf, senior calf, 2-year old, best three females, and dam and daughter classes. She also won the rosettes for junior, senior, and grand champion.

The only other exhibitor to bring first-place animals into the ring was Joyce Barczewski of Elkton who was at the halter of the top junior yearling and aged cow.

GUERNSEYS

Glenn Davis of Earleville

came within two placings of sweeping the entire show. He won all but the junior and senior yearling classes, which went to Holly England of Rising Sun and Lisa Davis of Earleville, respectively. As winner of most every class, the young man naturally enough had the junior champion, senior champion, and grand champion.

HOLSTEINS

Killdee Farms of Chesapeake City exhibited the senior and grand champion in the open show, while Sherri Lieske of Rising Sun had the top animal in the 4-H contest. The junior champion title on both counts was won by Lita Miller of Chesapeake City.

Farm Queen did her best

FAIR HILL, Md. - A young lady who was named 1978 Farm Queen during opening ceremonies of the Cecil County Fair, held here last month, lived up to her title in enviable fashion by exhibiting champion beef cattle and swine. In addition, Moily Johnson of Nottingham, was named a champion fitter and showman on several occasions.

In the beef show, the new Farm Queen exhibited the first place heavyweight and eventual champion steer. In addition, she was champion in the senior division for fitting and showmanship. The Southern Cecil County Young Farmers rewarded her efforts with the Ted Wechling Memorial Trophy. In that same contest, Tim Clugston of Elkton was named junior champion for showmanship and fitting. He was exhibitor of the lightweight champion.

Miss Johnson continued her winning ways in the market hog contest by winning both champion and reserve champion ribbons and again being named senior showmanship and fitting winner.

Betsy Johnson, also of Nottingham, and David Moore of Elkton placed second and third, respectively, in the showmanship and fitting contest. Miss Johnson won the lightweight contest with her entry.

In the market lamb show, which had 17 entries shown by eight exhibitors, Ross Johnson of Nottingham won the showmanship and fitting title among junior contestants. Pam and Christie Johnson, both of Nottingham, were second and third, respectively. The senior contest was won by Tom Barczewski of Elkton, with Dora Weaver, Perryville, placing second, and Jen Johnson, Nottingham, filling the third slot.

The 4-H'ers held their first livestock sale during the fair.

Truckers asked to limit driving

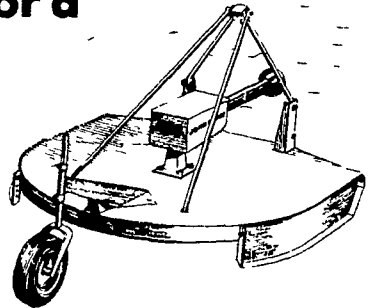

The champion lamb was bought by Brick House Farm for \$2.75 per pound and Tucker Mackie purchased the reserve champion for \$2.15 per pound. Other buyers of lambs were: Warren Johnson; Aberdeen Sales Co.; Kilby, Inc.; Southern States of Rising Sun, and Farmers and Mechanics Insurance Co.

William Baker purchased the champion hog for \$1.60 per pound and Southern States of Rising Sun bought the reserve champion for \$1.40 per pound. Hileman's Grinding Service, Steve Krauss, Delmar Equipment and Pioneer Valley Farm also purchased hogs.

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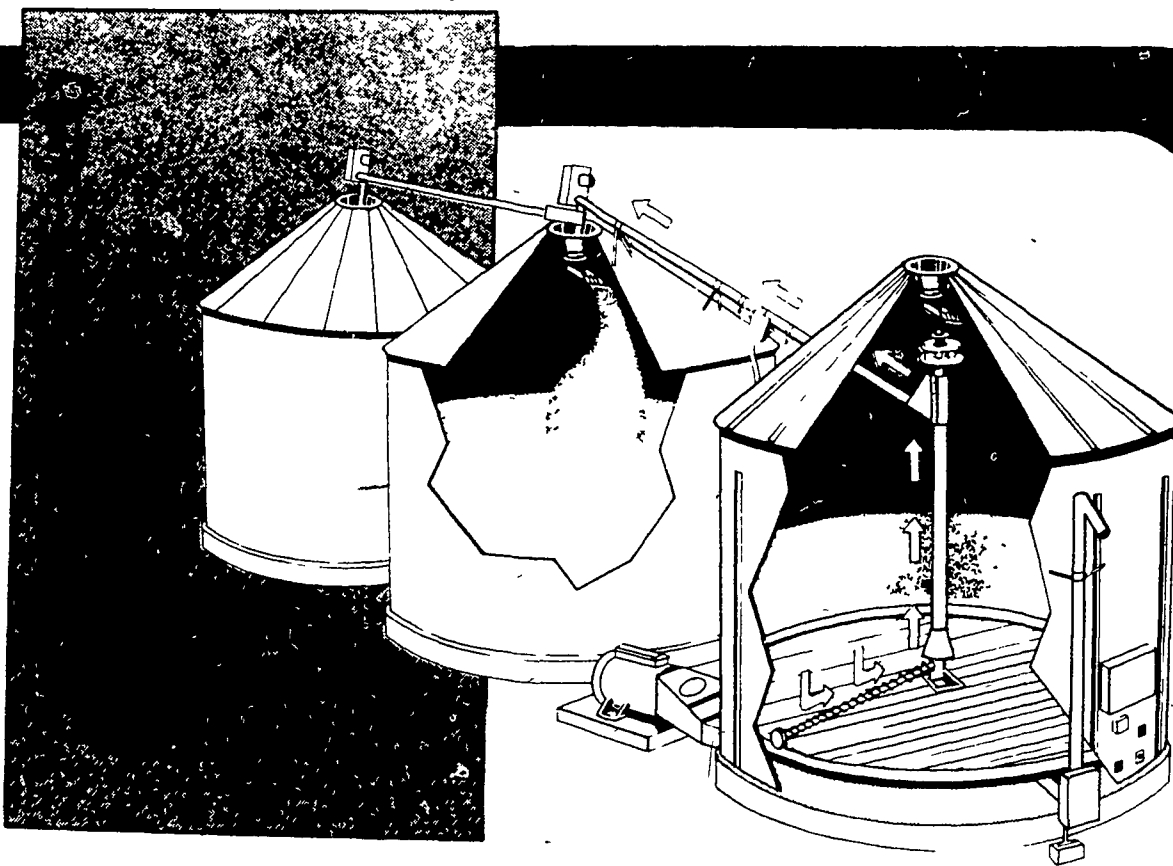
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
