The Cook-off winner describes her recipe as, "something that has been around in our family for some time. It's simple and

VENTILATION BROCHURE

Methods of saving electricity and heat through improved ventilation control are outlined in a new brochure on the Vent-O-Matic Farm Air Conditioner.

approximately two hours in the recipe marinade. Ribs are then cooked over "slow" coals and basted frequently with leftover marinade.

The marinade is prepared as follows: one-half cup soy sauce, three-quarters cup of honey, one small can pureed apricots, two heaping teaspoons brown sugar, and one teaspoon of ginger. Combine all five ingredients and heat until well blended, cool before using.

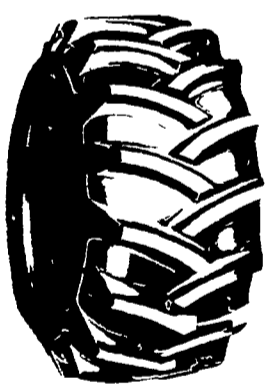
