Two to receive distinguished service awards

UNIVERSITY PARK – Rebecca J. Drick, Montoursville R1, and Ruth M. Hand, Pine Grove, will receive a Distinguished Service Award from the National Association of Extension Home Economists at their 44th annual meeting in Omaha, Nebraska, October 16 to 19.

Lycoming County Extension home economist on Penn State staff, Mrs. Drick will be cited for her educational programs in the Expanded Foods and Nutrition Education Program, food preservation, clothing construction, and 4-H youth and adult leader work. Mrs. Drick has been in charge of EFNEP in Lycoming County since the program began in Pennsylvania in 1969. Over 2,000 homemakers in both rural and urban areas are assisted by seven para-professionals under her direction.

Keeping Lycoming County residents up-to-date on food preservation techniques is another of Mrs. Drick's major program responsubilities. She uses radio programs, newsletters, demonstrations and workshops to teach proper food preservation by canning, freezing and drying. The Extension home economist has also served as chairperson of the Lycoming County Nutrition Education Committee which has given her the opportunity to coordinate the efforts of many professional workers presenting nutrition education programs.

Mrs. Drick's work with the 4-H program includes training sessions for 4-H food and nutrition and 4-H clothing club leaders, recruiting and training new 4-H leaders and training judging teams. She has also served as regional chairman for various 4-H events.

Her indepth clothing programs have been conducted for homemeakers and professionals alike. Adult leaders taking the training have gained greater confidence in teaching clothing to others.


