## First of a kind Holstein sale averages \$4162

MIDDLETOWN - The Pennsylvania Holstein association's all-new show, sales and export facilities opened to the public for the first time on Thursday night when the first All-American Sale was held there. Hundreds of visitors

were on hand to bid and browse. The top-selling animal of the sale was Woodbine Astro Molly-OC, a 5-month old calf sired by Paclamar Astronaut out of Woodbine Rockman Millie, a cow which is classified Excellent-91 and produced

25,939 pounds of milk and 899 of butterfat as a 5-year old. Buyer of the young calf was Robert Morris of Fawn Grove. The sale price was listed as \$19,000, with seller George Knight, Jr. of Woodbine retaining part interest.

## Eastern Milk Producers will build \$10 million cheese plant

SYRACUSE, N.Y. - One of the world's largest mozzarella cheese manufacturing plants has found a home in Wysox, Pa. Arden Tewksbury, Meshoppen, Pa. dairy farmer and president of Eastern Milk Producers Cooperative, made the announcement last week,

following a special board of directors meeting of the cooperative in Towanda, Pa. Eastern's site selection committee, which had been studying several locations over the past few months, decided on the Pennsylvania location because of availability of needed milk supplies. Cortland, N.Y. was

the other site which was being seriously considered recently. Tewksbury hailed the decision as, "Another positive step in the realization of stable marketing conditions for Eastern members throughout the Northeast."
