Edgar Snively, Elizabethtown, was the speaker for the evening. Snively, a swine specialist from Pennfield explained how the swine operation in Freystown works. The building and land is owned by Joe Habecker. Pennfield supplies the hogs, which are Babcock hybrids. Pennfield also helped Habecker in the design of his swine operation.

The swine are kept in total confinement, from farrowing to finishing. The operation can handle 500 or more

sows, with a weekly shipping goal of 180 to 200 pigs to market.

To enter the facility, everyone must shower. Clothing worn in the facility is laundered within the facility. No medication is added to the hogs feed, so these sanitary precautions are needed.

The floor used in the operation are made from expanded metal. Automatic scrapers are run twice daily. No manure is left to accumulate in the facility. "We have no regrets at all with

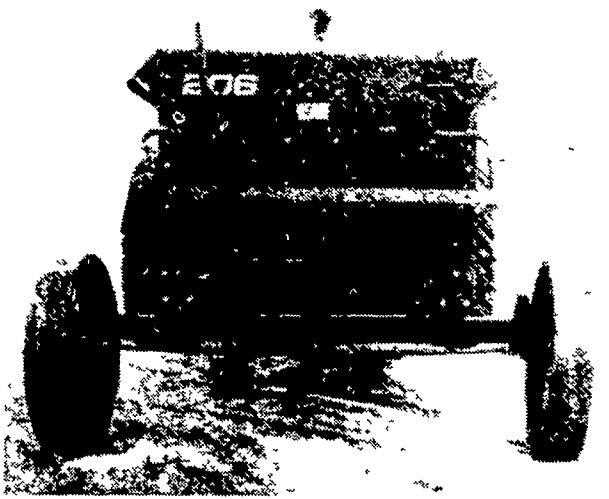
