

Franklin Co. beef and lamb champions named

GREENCASTLE — The 43rd annual Franklin County 4-H Baby Beef round-up and sale was held at the Greencastle Livestock Market on October 9 with 50 steers going across the auction block.

The grand champion steer shown by David Dice, Greencastle R2, was a 1095 Limousin-Hereford cross-bred. The steer was purchased by Smith's Implement Co. of Mercersburg for \$1.31 per pound.

The reserve grand champion was shown by Lynn Stoner, Waynesboro R3. The steer, a 1375 lb. Charlois-Simmental cross-bred was purchased by Safeway Stores of Hager-

stown, Md. for 93 cents per pound.

Ivan Niswander, Chambersburg R4, showed the medium heavy wt. champion, a 1175 pound. Hereford also purchased by Smith's Implement Co. for 61 cents per pound. Loren Burkholder, Chambersburg R4 showed the medium weight champion a 1055 pound steer purchased by Stouffer Bros., Chambersburg for 64 cents per pound. The light wt. champion shown by Connie Stull, Waynesboro R2, was purchased by the Brake Construction Company of St. Thomas for 62 cents per pound.

With the champions the

sale average 1099 pounds per steer with a value of 65.33 cents per pound.

Both the grand champion Lamb and grand champion pen of lambs was shown by Tim Donough, Chambersburg R5. Domenic Berto, Philadelphia, purchased the champion lamb for \$1.00 per pound and 75 cent per pound for the champion pen.

In the Novice Fitting and Showing competition, ages 9 to 12, Scott Kline, Greencastle R2, took first place showmanship honors and Loren Burkholder, Chambersburg R4, took first place fitting honors.

In the intermediate fitting and showing classes ages 13 and 14, Brenton Upperman, Chambersburg R3 was the winner in fitting and Cindy Donough, Chambersburg R5 took first in showmanship.

In the junior fitting and showing classes, ages 15 and 16 top honors were taken by Stacie Kline, Greencastle R2.
