Today he runs his own dairy farm, 125 acres which he rents. He owns 45 cows. Registered Holsteins, and stated that the main operation of the farm centers around the cows.

"I always wanted to be a dairy farmer, and I tried to become one," he stated. "And I guess that I believe that if you really want to do it, you can. You just have to work harder. And if you try harder, you can do it.

Kevin has been active in his FFA group, serving as vice president and reporter in the past as well as on many committees.

He has competed and won awards for his chapter, competing in land judging and participating in fairs. In the past, he was been named the star-agribusinessman of the Kutztown chapter.

Besides being involved in FFA, he is also a member of the Pioneer Grange, Topton, and was a 4-H member in the dairy and horse clubs.

He is a member of the Pennsylvania Farmers Assocation, the Berks County Holstein Association, the Kutztown Area Young Farmers Association, and serves on the Pennsylvania Farmers Association Dairy Committee.

He stated that FFA has taught him the importance of keeping good records and how to accurately do so. He also noted that he learned how and when to keep on trying, and the importance of listening to good advice.

When asked why he leaned towards the direction of dairy cows as his style of farming, Kevin thought for a moment, and then told how his grandfather had cows and he had always liked

them. And even though he grew up in town, he stated that he always knew that he wanted to farm, and that dairy just appealed to him over all the other possibilities available.

And so today, he and his recent bride, have their dairy farm.

But Kevin isn't content with just that. He looks to the future and hopes someday to buy his own farm and continue to expand his herd.
