In addition to evaluating live birds, the competition will include grading and evaluating a class of 10 ready to cook broiler-fryers, a class of ready to cook turkeys, and two classes of 24 white shell market eggs. Here again the teams will base their scores on U.S. Department of Agriculture standards.




