Fall swine sale held

The 27 Yorkshire bred gilts average \$808; 41 Landrace bred gilts average \$588; 32 Yorkshire Boars average \$643; 18 Landrace boars average \$424; 14 Landrace open gilts average \$313; 106 Commercial open gilts average \$227. The 238 head totaled \$102,590. for an

average of \$431 per head. The 132 purebred boars and gilts average \$595.

Yorkshire Boars Lot 74 and Lot 98 was sold for \$1600. Lot 74 was purchased by Bill Waugh Libertyville, Iowa. Lot 98 was purchased by Mitch Rogers Mayville, N.Y. when an imminent disaster situation may be developing says Congressman Robert Walker from Lancaster County, Pa.

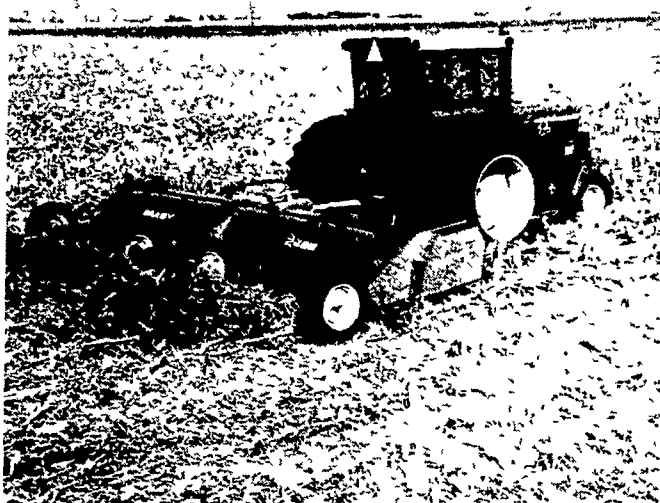
When this broadcast service becomes operational, it will culminate two years of effort by Walker through the House Committee on Science and Technology to provide southcentral Pennsylvania with a weather information and warning system.

According to the National

Weather Service, the climatic and atmospheric reporting, available 24 hours a day, will be broadcast on a high VHF frequency of 162.55 megahertz (MHz) with 250 watts of power.

While this frequency is too high for most existing AM-FM equipment, VHF receivers are commercially available at a relatively low cost and most new radio receivers offer this type frequency reception as a purchase option.

20 FEET STALK SHREDDER

APPLETON, Wis. - The new Brady 2400 stalk shredder is designed to shred more acres faster with less power than other shredders, according to Brady engineers.

The Brady 2400 is 20 feet wide, one of the biggest shredders on the market, and will cover eight 30-inch rows or six 40-inch rows with room to spare. The tear-drop hood design makes pulling easier and reduces knife maintenance; and the knife and drive efficiencies and the tear-drop design combine to provide top performance with up to 20 per cent less power than most other shredders, say Brady engineers.

The new shredder is designed for tractors up to 200 PTO HP.

Free swinging cup or side slicer knives are standard equipment, made of super alloy steel. All super alloy flail knives on Brady shredders are guaranteed against breakage for the life of the flail knife.

The shredder's rear lift design keeps the drive line straight to reduce drive shaft strain, giving more efficient power transmission to the gearbox.

Adjustable row spacing, end transport and a tongue jack are standard equipment, as are premium V-belts that are easily adjusted with a spring tightener.

Options include a ratchet jack for height adjustment, a center divider kit, and 15-inch wheels for standard end transport.

Brady equipment is manufactured by Koehring Farm Equipment Division, headquartered at Appleton, Wisconsin. The division also manufactures Fox forage harvesting and handling equipment.

QUICK-TACH LOADERS

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. - Three quick attaching-detaching loaders designed for tractors from 35 to 160 horsepower have been introduced by Schwartz Mfg. Co., Lester Prairie, Minnesota.

Three loaders are designed to fit most current and prior model tractors, with or without cabs. Model 1700 QT fits tractors from 35

to 75 horsepower; lifts up to 1850 lbs. with a 3325-lb. breakaway. The 1800 QT mounts on tractors in the 65 to 100 horsepower range and lifts up to 2915 lbs., breakaway of up to 5435 lbs. The Model 1900 QT mounts on 75 to 160-horsepower tractors. It lifts 4175 lbs., with a breakaway capacity of 5570 lbs.

Each of the Schwartz QT Loaders is designed with a wrap-around subframe that attaches to the tractor at front and mid-mounting points. Three inches tapered loader boom arms incorporate a designed "slim-line" crossmember for exceptional visibility and strength.

A wide range of buckets and attachments is available to fit most material handling jobs.

Schwartz Manufacturing Co., a division of Chromalloy Farm & Industrial Equipment Co., also manufactures six other models of tractor loaders. 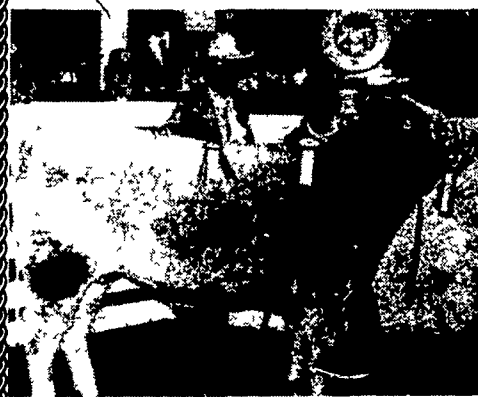

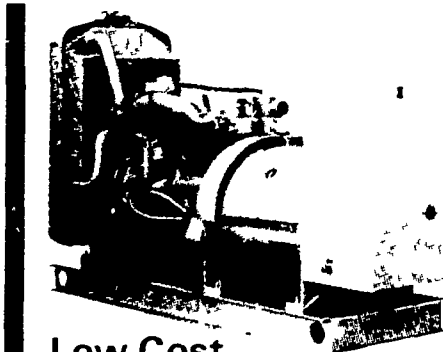
